







Interior designer Allison Babcock admits that her own

waterfront home in Sag Harbor, New York, is based on compromise. "I would be living in a tent if it was up to him," Allison says jokingly of her outdoors-loving husband, Luke. "This is our compromise. We're able to have interior space that still feels like we're living outside. He always wants to be outside, so that was super important."

The challenge was to create an open, modern home complete with generous open spaces and forward-thinking materials without giving up cozy decor. Architect Blaze Makoid proved to be the ideal design partner.

With a wish list in hand and a vision of leaving the crammed spaces and choppy floor plan of their previous historical house behind, the Babcocks and Makoid designed a home that embraces its lush surroundings. "We wanted a house that could feel like we were on vacation year-round," Allison says. "It's a great entertaining space. You're comfortable. Even in the winter you have beautiful views. And in the summer, you can open up."

Throughout the house, white walls, warm white-oak floors, and charcoal accents minimize interior distractions without compromising style. A sectional in the living room invites guests to appreciate the wood-burning fireplace while embracing the views. The space also seamlessly

opens into the dining area and kitchen. "It's super cozy," Allison says. "There's an informality about it too. It's not that stark glossy look most people associate with modern—it doesn't have to be that way."

It does have to be thoughtful though. Minimal furnishings mean each piece carries extra style weight. A midcentury console in the entry, a shapely leather chair in the master suite, and a custom walnut table in the dining space are decorating heavyweights. Allison avoided any guesswork by creating the furniture layout alongside Makoid's house design—long before the walls went up. "I couldn't wait to start the furniture plans," she says.

Much of Allison's focus went to a space that isn't inside the walls at all. While Luke is happy to never come inside, Allison prefers to limit her time in the sun. A grand covered porch running the length of the house handled both desires, ultimately becoming the family's favorite living area. Protected from the elements, a custom, lowback, deep-seated sectional welcomes without blocking the water and sunset views from inside. A nearby table hosts dinner nearly every summer evening. "We live on the porch during the warmer months," Allison says. Sometimes, compromise is the best plan of all.

Allison doesn't like wasted space, so the master bedroom is only as big as necessary, with a sliding barn-style door separating the suite's bedroom and bath. Chosen for its sculptural shape, a leather chair in the corner of the master bedroom complements the room's neutral hues. Allison searched high and low for a just-right bathtub for the master; she settled on a custom, poured-concrete tub. Protected by a generous overhang and metal roof, the porch is Allison, Luke, Stallard, and Lily's favorite spot. Luke took advantage of an original-tothe-property shed by adding an outdoor shower made private by repurposing surfboards as walls.
